

## **Elder Gift Bags**

One Program Partner thankful for this year's Elder Gift Bag service is the Pisinemo Senior Center on the Tohono O'odham reservation in southern Arizona.

82-year-old Alfred, one of the Elders and the only resident of the Nestors community, has little family left and usually stays home for Christmas these days, But after opening his SWRA Gift Bag, he smiled and shared, "I really appreciate... knowing someone is out there caring about us... I'll remember them in my prayers. Thank you for everything you brought me."

## **Holiday Meals**

Our Program Partner Lottie recently organized a Christmas Community Meal at the Crow Tribal Senior Citizens Center in Lodge Grass, Montana, thanks to holiday food from PWNA.

The meal was a social opportunity for Elders like 79year-old Angela, who lives alone and hasn't seen many people since COVID struck her community. She shared, "The holidays are a prayerful time for us. We try to honor everybody, and we're thankful for what we have ... The income in this area is so low. It's a real challenge for the whole community."



## Children's Stockings

Our Program Partner Gila River FACE Program recently held a Santa Stop for students at the Gila Crossing Community School on the Gila River Reservation in Laveen, AZ. While children greeted Santa with hugs and laughter and walked away smiling with arms wrapped around stockings, moms Heather and Christina deeply appreciated the service.

Christina shared, "There are a lot of families here that aren't fortunate enough to buy gifts themselves." Heather thanked PWNA donors, saying, "Just keep doing what you're doing; you're really helping a lot of families."
