SERVED THROUGH HEALTH SERVICES

Native Americans have experienced economic stress at higher rates than many other groups. Program Partner Christy works with the Fort Yuma Indian Health Service Public Health Nursing (IHS-PHN) in Winterhaven, California. She utilizes the Healthy Living service to increase participation in preventative care, home visits, and health screenings.

43-year-old Elena feels that the supplies provided by PWNA go a long way in her household. She shared, "[The donors] don't know how much it empowers us people, especially someone like me who is a single parent taking on five people in the home and doesn't get any extra [financial support], but we're making it. It lets us know there are still people there who care and want to help other people who are less fortunate or are really trying to make it. It's a helping hand, and it feels nice. Not too many people want to do that. Thank you, I appreciate it so much."

Remedy is a junior nursing student who received a scholarship for the 2023-2024 academic year from our American Indian Education Fund® (AIEF) program.

With only one hospital and a few small clinics back home on the Rosebud Reservation, Remedy discussed the need for role models in health back home. In addition to school, Remedy balances sports, cultural teachings, and a part-time job.

Without the AIEF scholarship, she would've had to take on another job, affecting her academics as well as her mental and physical well-being. She shared, "I want to let the donors know that they're changing lives and making a difference. I wouldn't be able to do this well in school if I didn't have this scholarship."
